Photographer Jake Rajs will be at Tulla Booth Gallery, 66 Main Street, Sag Harbor, this Sunday, July 1 from 5 to 7 p.m. to sign copies of his books, including "New York City of Islands," "Between Sea and Sky" and "Landscapes of Long Island's North Fork." Rajs work is on view at the gallery in "Natural Wonders" a two man show running through July 6 which also features the photographs of Daniel Jones.

"Natural Wonders" is a show of large-scale images of nature's startling moments. Rajs is a widely traveled and well published photographer with many Rizoli books and

many others including "The Hudson River From Tear in the Clouds to Manhattan," "Cherry Blossoms," "These United States," "World Trade Center 2002 Memorial," "Sometime Lofty Towers: A Photographic Memorial of the World Trade Center" and several others.

His most recent book is a vivid account of the wonderful sites in the North Fork of Long Island. A South Fork book is forthcoming.

Daniel Jones has been documenting the great outdoors for over 20 years and his graphic large scale black and white, silver gelatin prints are mostly taken with a large format camera and film. He travels the country for weeks at a time in the spirit of Ansel Adams.

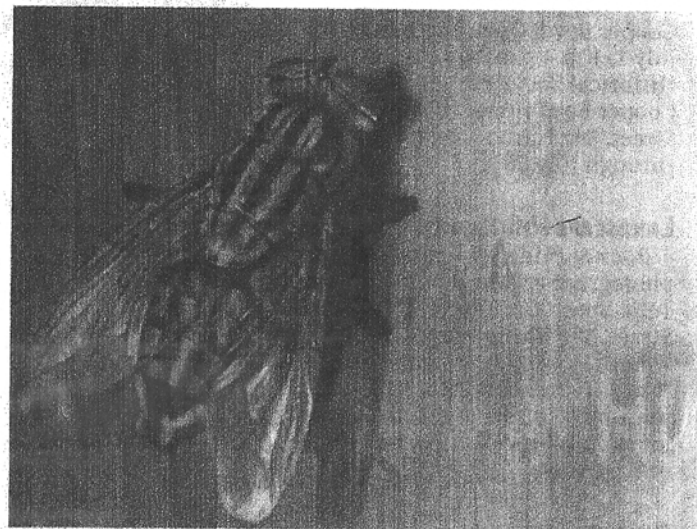

The Nature of Art Opens

This weekend, "The Nature of Art" a new group exhibition goes on view at Karin Sanders Fine Art in Sag Harbor. The show opens this Saturday, June 30 with a reception for the artists from 5 to 7 p.m. With 10 artists taking part, this is the gallery's largest group show to date, and it focuses on the natural surroundings through a variety of media, including paint on canvas, photography and sculpture.

The artists taking part in the show include Eric Demarchelier, Michael Souter, Millie Falcaro, Richard Bruce, Suzanne Opton, Edit Nadelhaft, Arlene Slavin, Matthew Riva, Angela Boloian and Sharon Wandel. Themes in the show include water, sky, botanicals, trees, birds and farm animals and even the microcosmic environment of insects. The transience of nature is explored while at times it seems contained within the artworks themselves.
